Operations Branch
Deputy Chief Trent

The Operations Branch is broken down into (2) two divisions, Operations and Hazardous Material/Medical. The Operations Division is overseen by Assistant Chief Russ Lafferty and assisted by Battalion Chief Jared Melton. These gentlemen are responsible for the operations and supervision of fire stations, apparatus, firefighting personnel and fire ground operations at incidents. The Hazardous Material/Medical Division is overseen by Assistant Chief Dennis Clinton and assisted by Battalion Chief Shane Vaughan. These gentlemen are responsible for the medical and hazardous material policies and protocols, operation and readiness of the hazardous material response personnel, medical and hazardous material equipment and personnel training.

In 2009 the Operations division responded to 1321 calls for service. This is a 1.5% decrease over the previous year and 5.1% increase over 2007. The decrease can be contributed to several different areas but mainly due to less structure fires and water rescues from the previous year.

The operational fleet of the district was upgraded during the year of 2009 with the acquisition of a 2001 Pierce 105' Ladder Truck and a 2010 KME Predator Severe Service Rear Mount Pumper. These trucks are in-service to serve at Station #1 and Station #2 respectively. The addition of these apparatus it provides opportunities to improve our insurance rating with decrease response times and increased fire pump flow which are always key points during evaluation.

The Hazardous Material Division and EMS Division were during the year seeking grant funds to improve the operations of the divisions. The Haz-Mat team acquired flash suits gaining them the ability to work in the combustible environment. While the EMS has not received grant funds it is looking very favorable for them to be awarded funds to purchase new cardiac monitors with integrated automatic external defibrillators. Additionally, the EMS Division was audited by the State of Missouri regarding the advanced life support (ALS) program, the audit did not reveal any infractions.

In conclusion it has been a very exciting and busy year for everyone with the anticipation of continued growth in the district. We look forward in the upcoming year to serving our residents and those traveling through or visiting.

The Technical Services Division continued a growth trend in 2009 with increased programming and the continued development of programs previously in place. A relationship with the Springfield Safe Kids Coalition continued in 2009. This coalition continues to support our endeavors in the areas of fire and injury prevention throughout the fire district. A yearly event has been established partnering with St. Johns Health Systems, Springfield Safe Kids Coalition and Premier Auto Outlet to provide much needed child passenger safety education to parents and children throughout the district especially in Webster County. Our CPS (Child Passenger Safety) program continues to grow in 2009. The district was able to send an additional four personnel to the CPS Technician course this year through grant money provided by the Missouri Department of Transportation. This brings the total number of certified car seat technicians to (7) seven. We also renewed our contract with the Missouri Department of Transportation and NHTSA to secure an additional shipment of all types of car seats to be used in our program. The bike safety and bike helmet program for all third-grade students was also continued this year. This program now held annually in May increases awareness of injury reduction when riding bikes, ATV's, skateboards, etc. Through this program and grant money from the Webster Electric Foundation every third grade student in the Logan-Rogersville School District is provided with a bicycle helmet that is fitted properly to their head.

The Fire Prevention and Public Education functions of the Technical Services Division continue to focus on decreasing residential fires in our district and increasing awareness of what to do should a fire in the home or place of business occur. We were once again able to obtain smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors from both the Springfield Safe Kids Coalition and Home Depot of Springfield. We continue to focus on target areas considered to be high risk throughout the district with our smoke detector program. This program is also promoted during public relations events and through media blitzes throughout the year. In October crews took to the streets and went door to door checking over 75 (seventy-five) smoke detectors in these target areas. We continue to receive 9 volt batteries from

the Energizer Company to help ensure residents in our district have working smoke detectors. We were also able to revitalize the residential safety survey program this year. This is a great opportunity for our staff to point out existing hazards that could result in fire, injury or death in homes throughout the district. In October we also held an Open House event as an additional outreach to the community. Over 400 (four-hundred) children, adults and seniors attended this event. During the open house we were able to educate visitors on the FireWise Program and Wildfire Prevention. We continue to work with the Missouri Department of Conservation, Missouri RC&D and FireWise to educate both young and old on the dangers of open burning. Through our presentation of this information at the open house we were able to obtain grant money from Missouri RC&D towards further education efforts.

The business inspection program continued to grow this year with increased commercial development through the fire district. This is an essential program to ensure our community is safe to live, work and play in. There continues to be a positive response from business owners and tenants during fire inspections of churches, schools, business offices, restaurants, etc. throughout the district. The Knox Box program continues to grow. As we continue to educate existing business owner's of this program our installation rates increase. We have also started to see an interest in Knox Key Switches from some of our gated areas. In 2009 we initiated our Display and Proximate Fireworks inspection program. While this program is somewhat seasonal in nature it is a very important to make sure our community is safe while attending these festivities. We are looking forward to an exciting September in 2010. The National Fireworks Association will conduct their conference in our fire district.

The Training Division will be very busy the first half of the year with the 2010 Firefighter I & II course. We have spent the last four months preparing to host 29 (twenty-nine) students from multiple agencies throughout the area. This will keep everyone busy as we conduct classroom sessions and practical evolutions. In December we were able to have the burn trailer from Southern Stone County on hand at Station One for live fire training. Both paid staff and volunteers continue to excel in the training endeavors at the local, state and national level in all disciplines.

In conclusion it has once again been a very busy year. We can only move upward from here with anticipated growth and development of the community we serve. It takes all of us to make sure that we continue to promote fire and property loss reduction. We have been fortunate to not see any significant injury or death to a civilian due to a residential fire.

Fire Prevention:

This year the Fire Prevention Division conducted the following activities:

1. Completed two-hundred and fifty five (255) annual inspections.
2. This year's re-inspection percentage dropped significantly. Business owners and tenants are starting to maintain their properties at a higher level.
3. A total of five (5) sets of building plans were reviewed for new construction throughout the district. This included plans that were sent back for a second review after changes.
4. Knox Box installations increased once again this year. We are starting to see boxes installed throughout all areas of the district.

Training:

In 2009, Logan-Rogersville personnel received 3, 282 hours of training.

Public Relations:

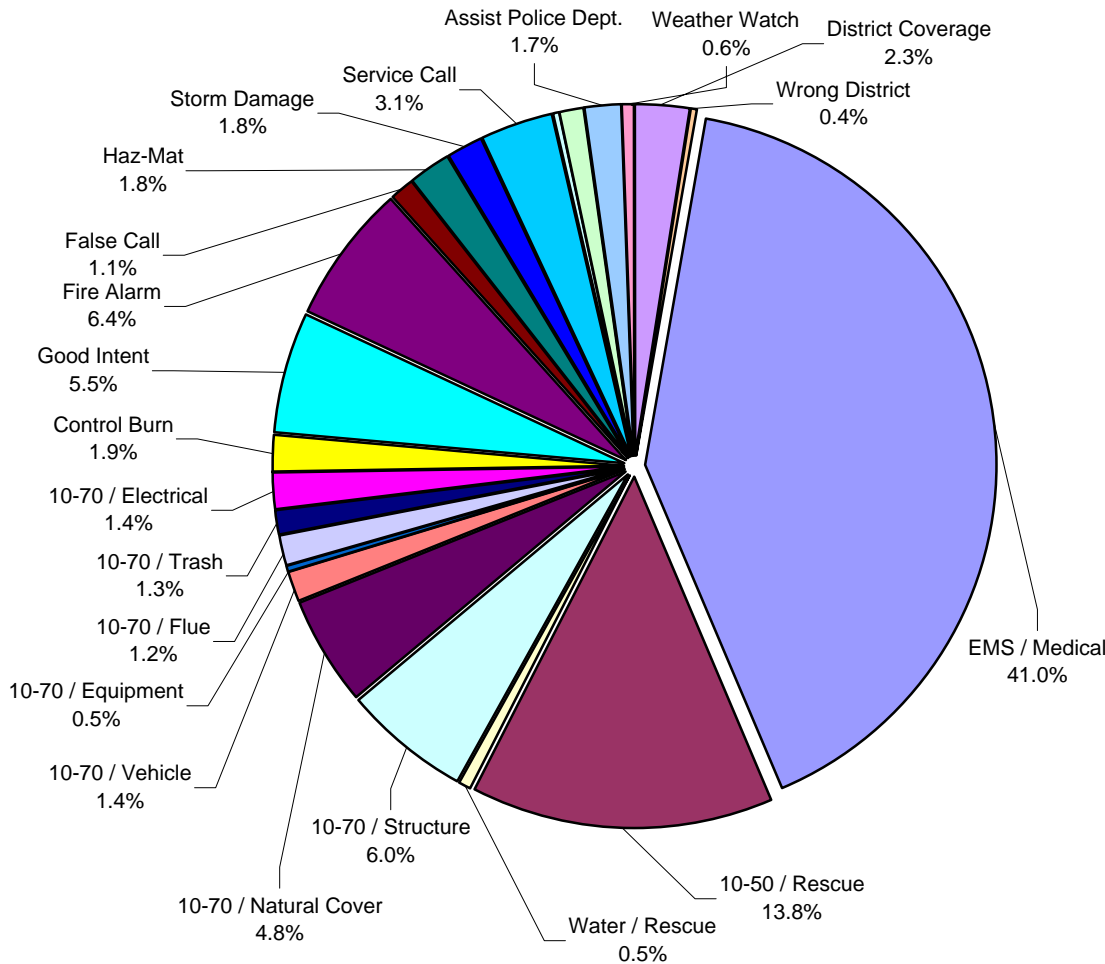
1. We installed seventy-eight (78) smoke detectors in seventy-two (72) single-family dwellings. We also installed sixty-five (65) batteries in sixty-two (62) single-family dwellings.
2. Carbon Monoxide Detectors (CO). This program is now in the fourth year. The Springfield Home Depot provided all of our CO Detectors this past year. We installed thirteen (13) CO Detectors in thirteen (13) single-family dwellings.
3. We conducted thirty-three (33) Residential Safety Surveys throughout the year.
4. We continue to conduct blood pressure screenings at the Rogersville Senior Center twice a month. On average crews conduct twenty-two screenings per session.
5. The Mobile Fire Safety Learning Center (MFSLC) was placed in service at nine (9) events. This year over 1,000 children were educated through realistic educational sessions.
6. We provided three (3) EMS standbys at requested events.
7. We provided five (5) fire standbys at requested events.
8. We continue to work very closely with the school district in education children of the importance of fire safety and prevention. This year we visited over 1,000 students in the schools.
9. We continue to assist the school district in parking vehicles at all home football games and graduation. With the success of the football team this year we parked record amounts of vehicles.
10. District Headquarters was toured twenty-two (22) times this year. The fire station continues to be a popular birthday destination and scouting destination.
11. We received twenty-seven (27) thank you cards or letters from the community for various reasons.
12. The fire district hosted sixteen (16) birthday parties at District Headquarters.
13. We conducted CPR education for two (2) places of business and four (4) civic groups throughout the district. The total number of students educated was fifty-four (54).

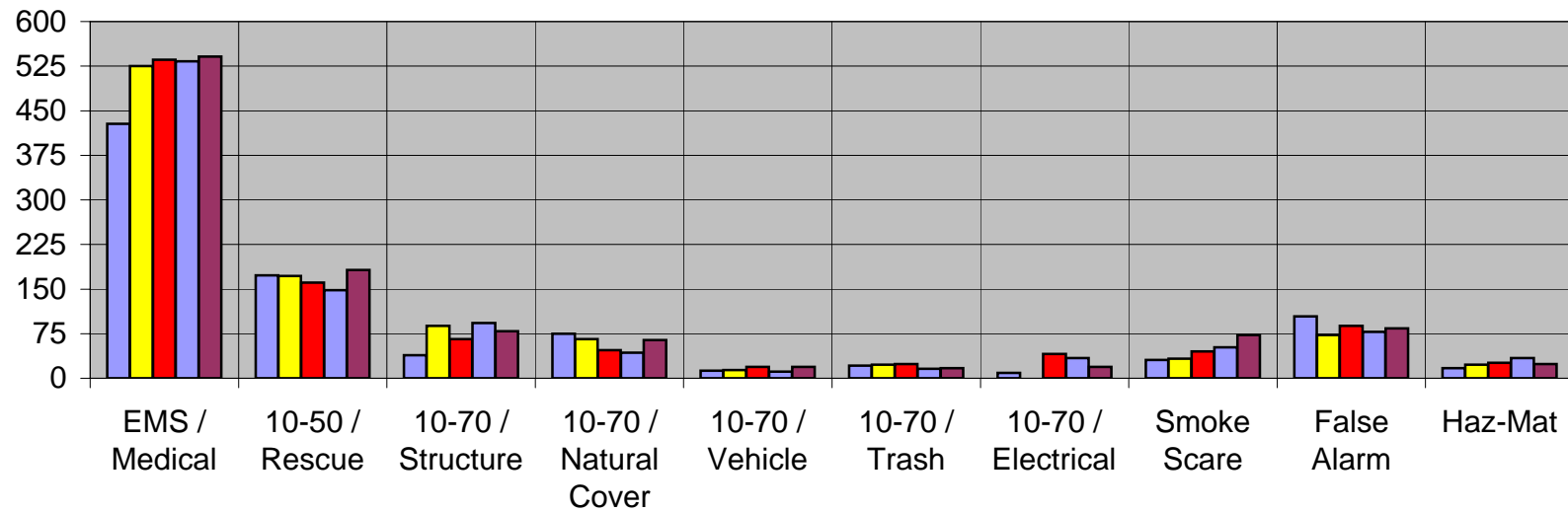

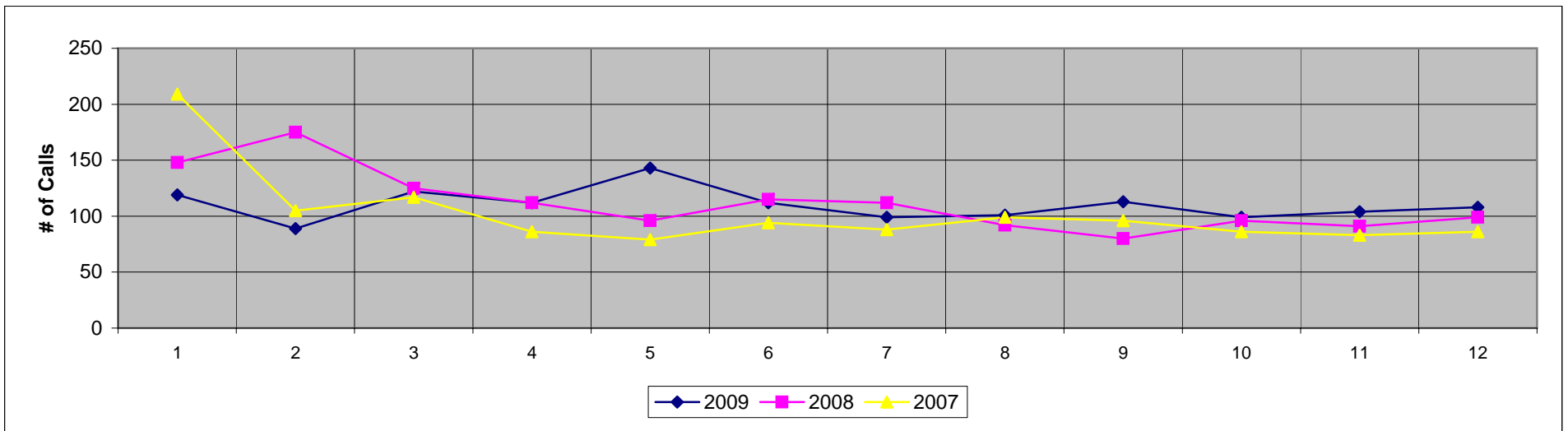

NUMBER OF EMERGENCY CALLS PER MONTH > 2007 THROUGH 2009 <



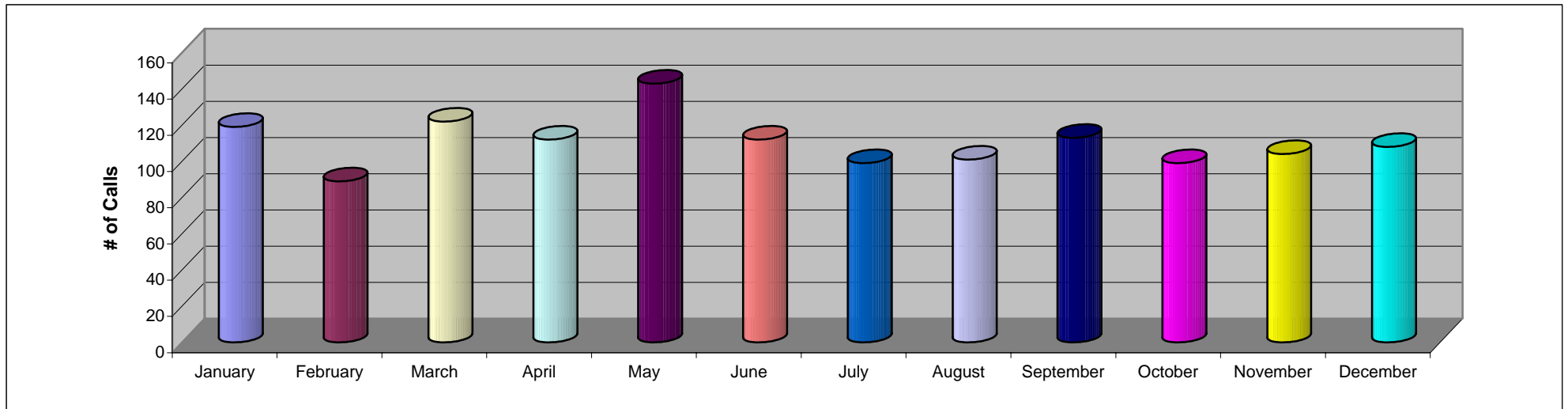

NUMBER OF EMERGENCY CALLS PER MONTH DURING THE YEAR OF 2009



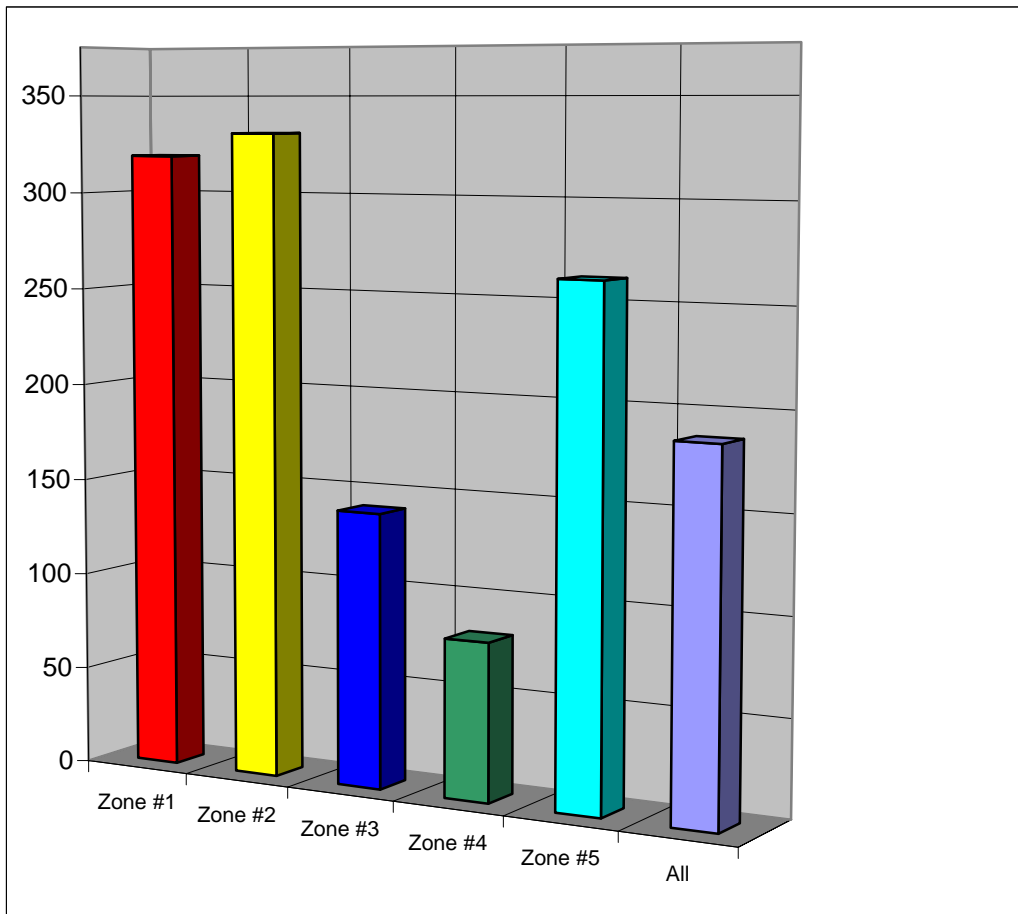

EMERGENCY CALLS RUN PER STATION ZONE DURING THE YEAR OF 2009



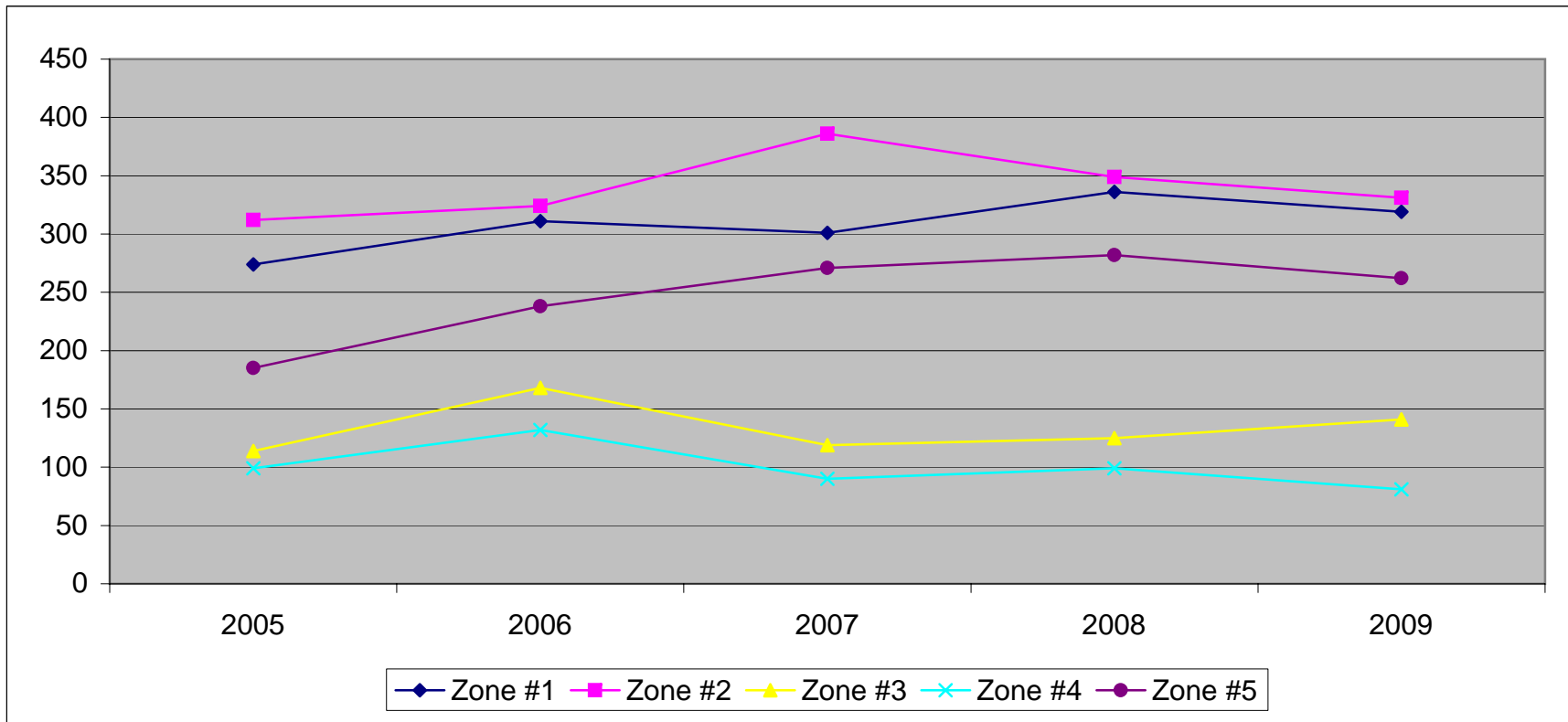

EMERGENCY CALLS RUN PER STATION ZONE > 2005 THROUGH 2009 <



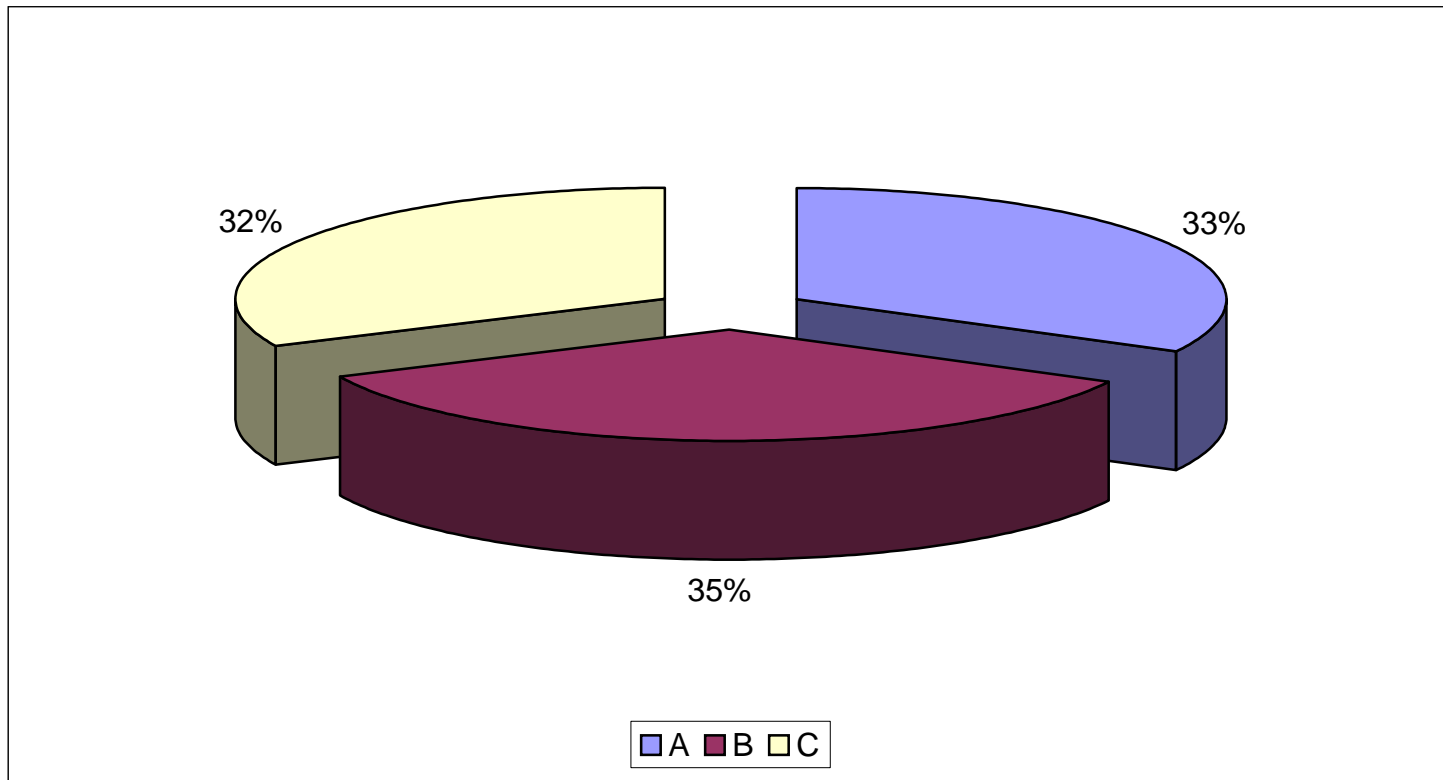

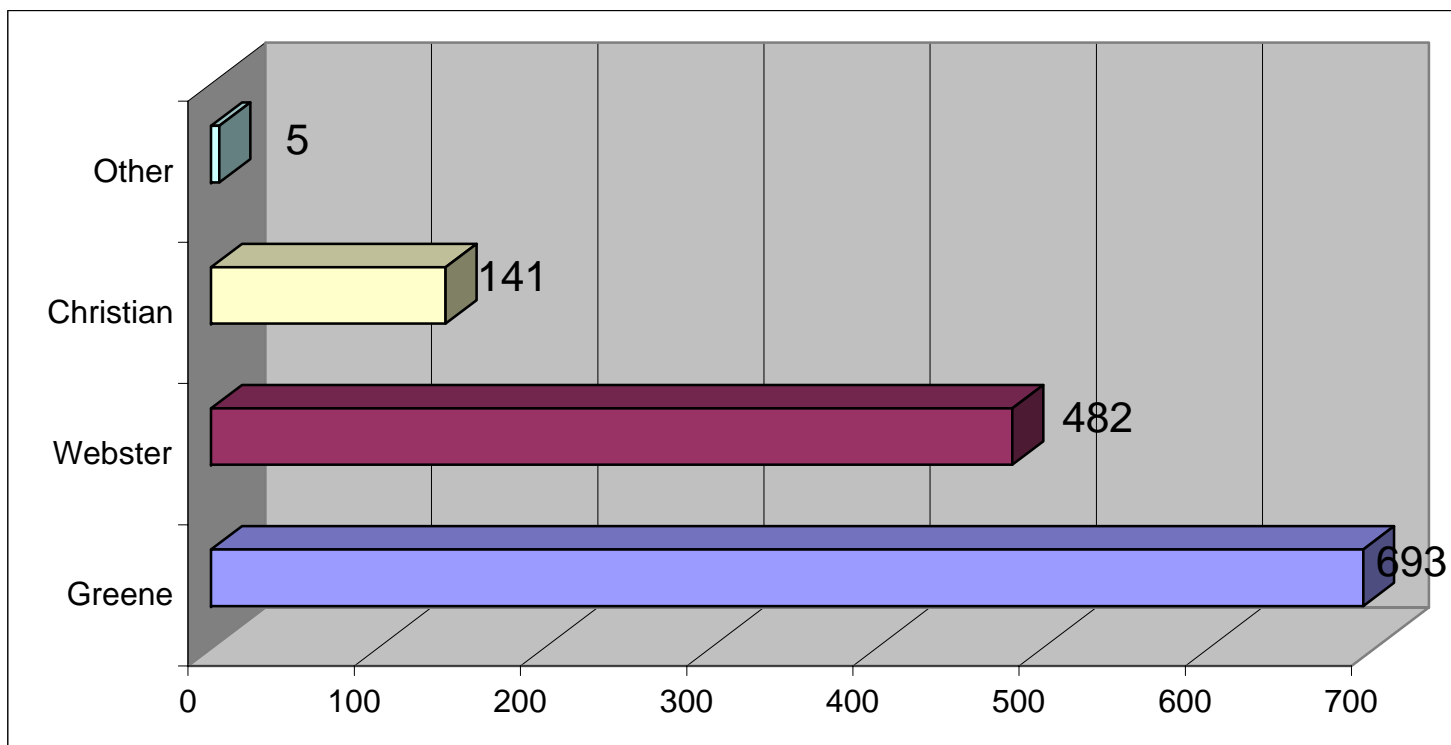
