Operations Branch
Deputy Chief Trent

The Operations Branch is broken down into (2) two divisions, Operations and Hazardous Material/Medical. The Operations Division is overseen by Assistant Chief Randy Mantle and assisted by Battalion Chief Jared Melton. These gentlemen are responsible for the operations and supervision of fire stations, apparatus, firefighting personnel and fire ground operations at incidents. The Hazardous Material/Medical Division is overseen by Assistant Chief Dennis Clinton and assisted by Battalion Chief Shane Vaughan. These gentlemen are responsible for the medical and hazardous material policies and protocols, operation and readiness of the hazardous material response personnel, medical and hazardous material equipment and personnel training.

In 2006 the Operations division responded to 1279 calls for service. This is a 15.7% increase over the previous year and 17.6% increase over 2004. A key statistic to be noted for the past year is the decrease in the margin between EMS and Fire related calls. Previous years we have averaged a 15-20% difference between these types of calls but in 2006 this margin was less than 10%. This is an area of concern for us and we will be targeting some new programs to address these fire related issues.

It was a very busy year for both the Operations and HazMat/EMS Divisions. Great strides were made during the year to increase the protection and safety for our customers. The following are some highlights of the accomplishments by the two divisions.

The Technical Service Branch consists of four (4) Divisions:

Public Education/Relations, Lt. Talburt
Training, Lt. Talburt
Fire Investigations, Cpt. Clarkson
Fire Prevention, A/C Mantle

Last years smoke detector program was targeted for improvement. This year we managed to reverse the downward trend and will continue to push for improvement. Lt. Talburt has spearheaded his Division in new areas such as the bicycle helmet program with the Logan-Rogersville School District. The helmet program along with our Smoke and CO detector programs are funded by the Springfield Safe Kids Coalition. Our affiliation with the Springfield Safe Kids will only get better and help us in making the L-R Fire District a safe place to live and play. Our open house during Fire Prevention Week went well. We incorporated a way of creating a fun environment laced with real hands on fire safety education. The enjoyable day would have been better if the weather had cooperated. We received a grant from Energizer Battery Company for two hundred fifty (250) 9 volt batteries to be used for smoke detectors.

Our Fire Investigation activities have been stepped up, but this sometimes creates a delay in the administrative process. Our lack of trained investigators occasionally hampers our ability to complete an investigation thoroughly. We are striving to increase our numbers of certified fire investigators. Our plan is to have one on each shift.

Fire Prevention is an extremely important Division of the Fire District. Certainly a fire prevention program will improve our ability to fight fires and will save untold lives in the future. Our feelings are the only way to keep our number of firefighters at a responsible manning level is through strong fire codes with professional enforcement.

Public Education/Relations:

(Lieutenant Talburt)

1. We installed seventeen (17) smoke detectors in fourteen (14) single-family dwellings. We also installed nine (9) batteries in two single-family dwellings.
2. Carbon Monoxide Detectors (CO). This program is in its third year. The Springfield Safe Kids Coalition (SSKC) provides us with CO Detectors. We installed four (4) CO Detectors in four (4) single-family dwellings.
3. We conducted twenty-four (24) blood pressure screenings, all at the Rogersville Senior Center. Approximately four hundred (400) senior citizens are evaluated annually.
4. Our Mobile Fire Safety Learning Center (MFSLC) was placed in service at twelve (12) events. We counted five hundred fifteen (515) children that were educated in home fire safety. The MFSLC was loaned out three (3) times to various government agencies.
5. We provided twelve (12) EMS stand-by's at requested events.
6. We provided seven (7) Fire stand-by's at requested events.
7. Our three (3) portable shelters were deployed at nine (9) requested events.
8. The Haz-Mat Trailer was placed on display at three (3) locations in the district.
9. We visited L-R Elementary Schools during Fire Prevention Week; we utilized the National Fire Protection Association's curriculum on cooking fires and educated over nine hundred twenty-six (926) students. We also utilized the Springfield Safe Kids Coalition (SSKC) "All Hazard House". We also visited three (3) day care centers and discussed fire safety with over twenty (20) children.
10. Our fire prevention week open house at fire station #1 was attended by over four hundred twenty-eight (428) citizens young and old.
11. Station #1 was toured seven (7) times this year.
12. We received in the mail and hand delivered twenty-nine (29) thank-you's for services rendered.
13. We hosted five (5) birthday parties at #1.
14. We assisted SSKC with fitting and issuing one hundred fifty-six (156) bicycle helmets for all (L-R) third grade students.
15. Miscellaneous activities;
 - a. Assisted area farmers with drought conditions by shuttling water.
 - b. Hosted three (3) week-ends of hunter safety classes.
 - c. Provided an engine for McTeachers night at McDonalds over one hundred (100) children toured the engine.

- d. Parked over a thousand cars at the L-R High School graduation.
- e. Hosted the quilt club for twelve meetings. The quilt club no longer uses our facility.

Training:

(Lieutenant Talburt)

In 2006, Logan-Rogersville firefighters received 4,280.25 hours of training and earned 6,226 call points. L-R Firefighters received the following certifications: The total number of current certifications is also shown below.

Fire Investigations:

(Captain Clarkson)

The district has two (2) certified investigators and one (1) resource investigator.

The Investigation Division stayed active and investigated twenty–eight (28) incidents. This is a marked increase over the past years due to an aggressive approach in investigating all suspicious incidents. Unfortunately because of our aggressive attitude some incendiary fires were not thoroughly investigated because of our inability to follow-up. Chief Stirts has approved the compensation time necessary, but trained manpower is not always available. Several times a Missouri State Fire Marshall was called for support, but there inability to follow through was disheartening. We conducted the following types and numbers of investigations:

Fire Prevention:

(Assistant Chief Mantle)

The Fire Prevention Division currently has one (1) certified fire inspectors enforcing the 2000 International Fire Code within the City of Rogersville. It is our intent to work with the City Rogersville to have them adopt the 2006 International Fire Code for us to enforce in calendar year 2007. We are also contemplating adopting the International Fire Code for the entire fire protection district. Our Knox Box Ordinance had been adopted for all new construction and will be in full force this 2007 building season. The Knox Box program will allow us emergency access to all new commercial structures in a timely manner and will assist us in simplifying the entry process in gated communities and other required areas.

This year the Fire Prevention Division conducted the following activities:

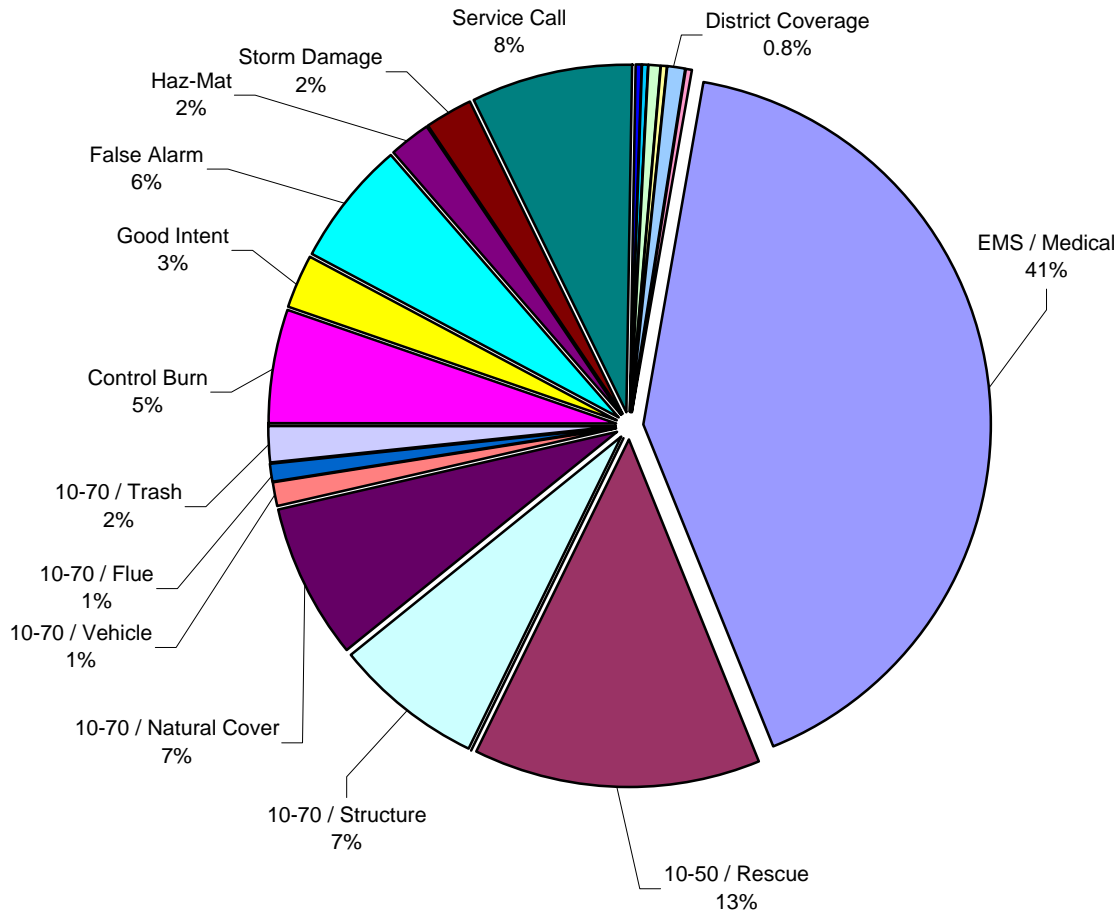
- We conducted ninety-eight (98) Inspections and Re-Inspections (city and county as required). We have eleven (11) city commercial/public building due for inspections. We have ten (10) re-inspections approaching their due date.
- We conducted one hundred twenty-three (123) Pre-Incident Surveys and Courtesy Fire Inspections (city and county).
- We had twenty-four (24) new businesses opened.
- We had nine (9) businesses closed.
- Conducted annual fire inspection in all L-R Schools.
- Reviewed the building plans for (9) Business Occupancies for code compliance. This total includes remodels.
- Performed twelve (12) requested walk thru surveys.
- Reviewed three (3) Subdivision Plot/Lot plans for compliance.
- Ongoing work with gated housing developments and residences on updated codes and access issues.
- Addressed two (2) approved subdivisions.
- Conducted twenty four (24) pre occupancy inspections of new town homes.
- Established fire lanes at CHC Home Center and L-R High School. Compliance has been difficult; we are having continuing enforcement problems at the high School.
- The Logan-Rogersville Shop of the Southern Missouri Professional Firefighters Local 3904 started a program to provide smoke detectors to the residents of the fire district that don't qualify for any existing detector program. Local 3904 installed six (6) smoke detectors.

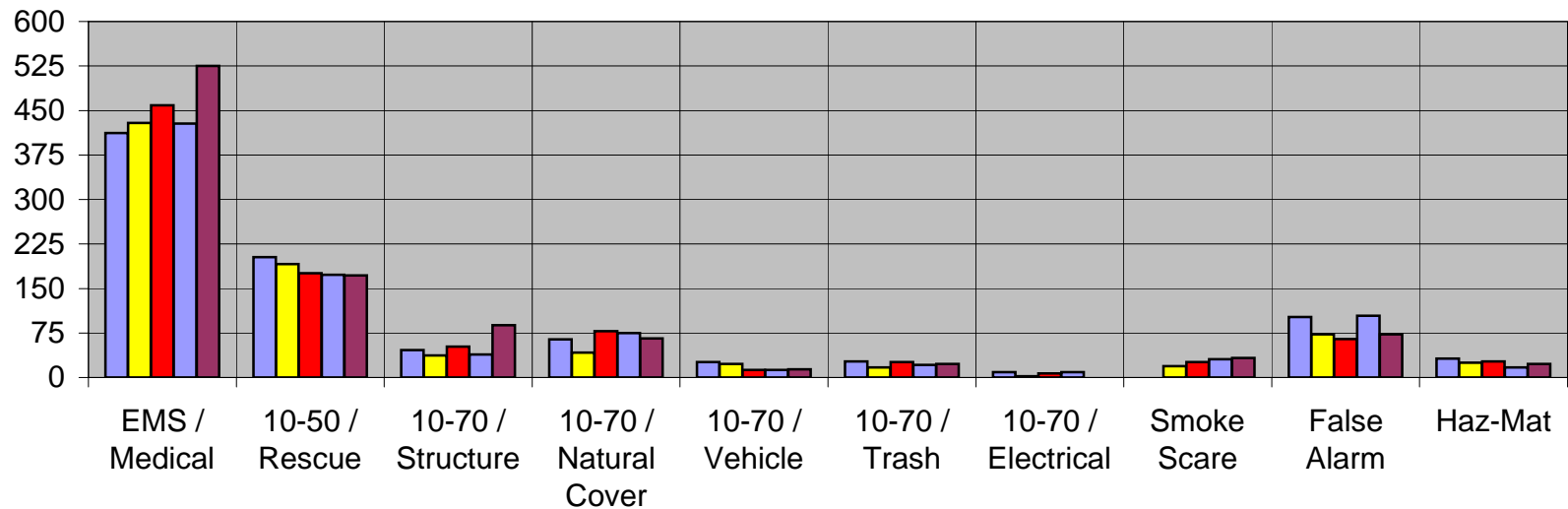

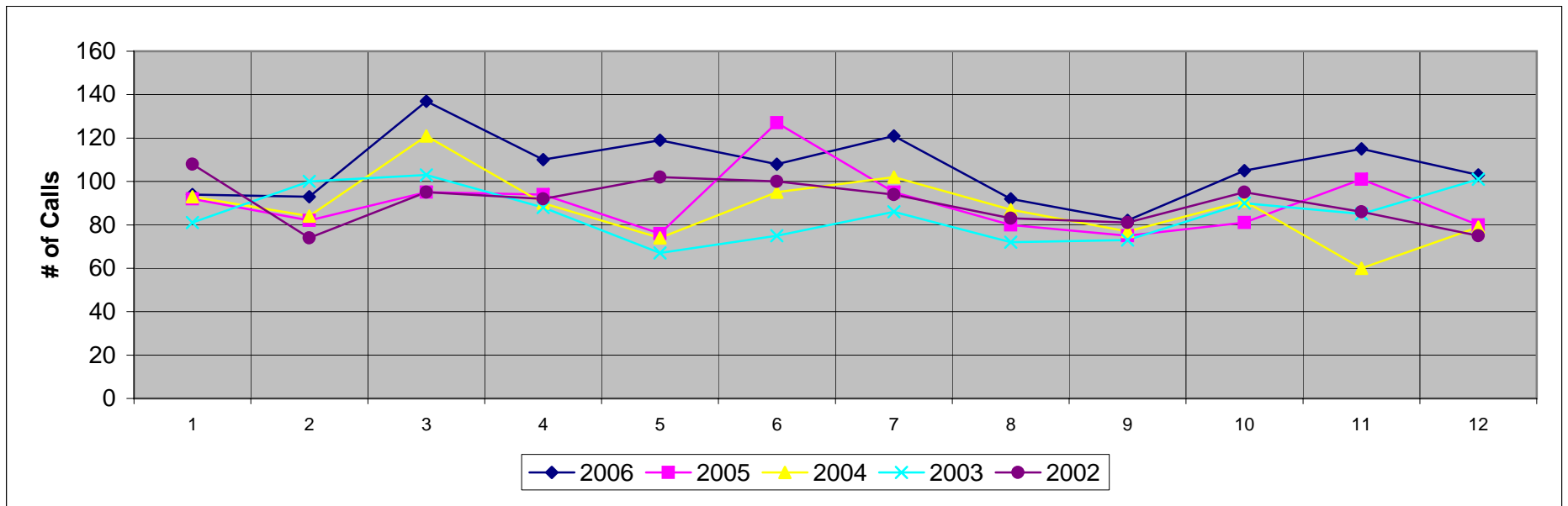

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NUMBER OF EMERGENCY CALLS PER MONTH > 2002 THROUGH 2006 <



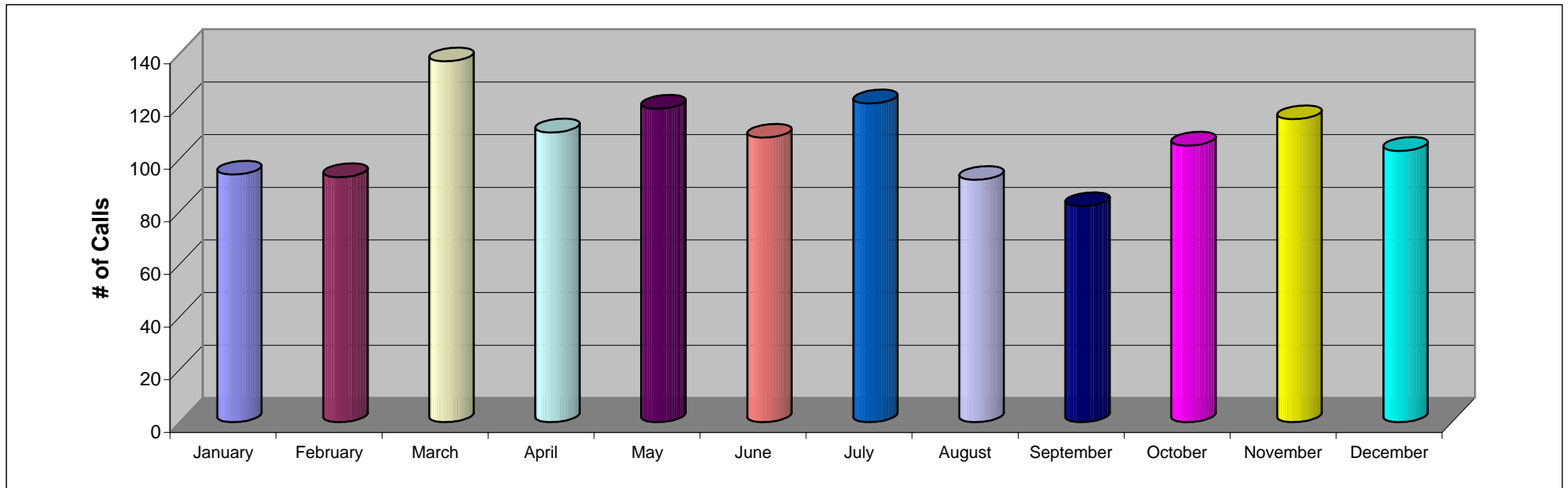

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NUMBER OF EMERGENCY CALLS PER MONTH DURING THE YEAR OF 2006



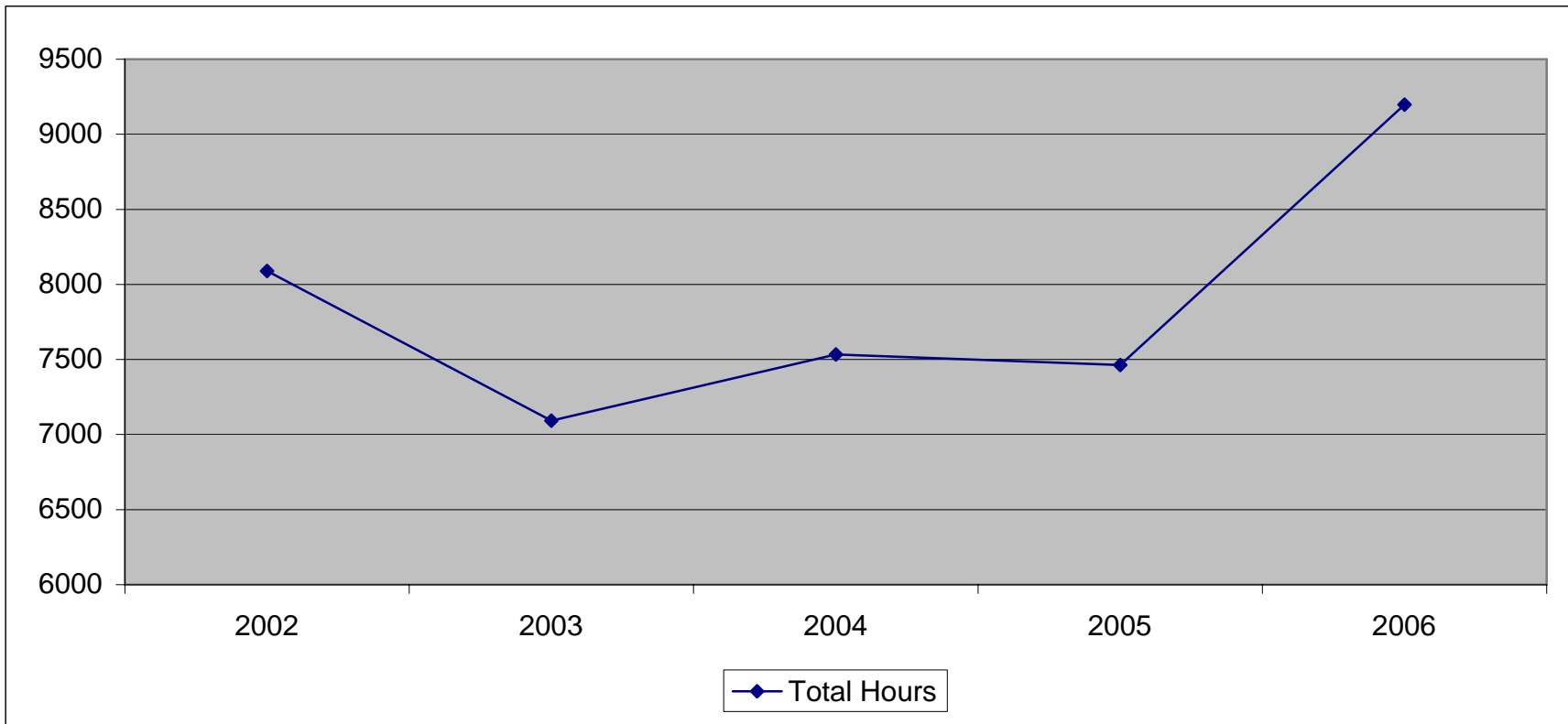

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TOTAL HOURS ON EMERGENCY CALLS/ RESPONSE > 2002 THROUGH 2006 <



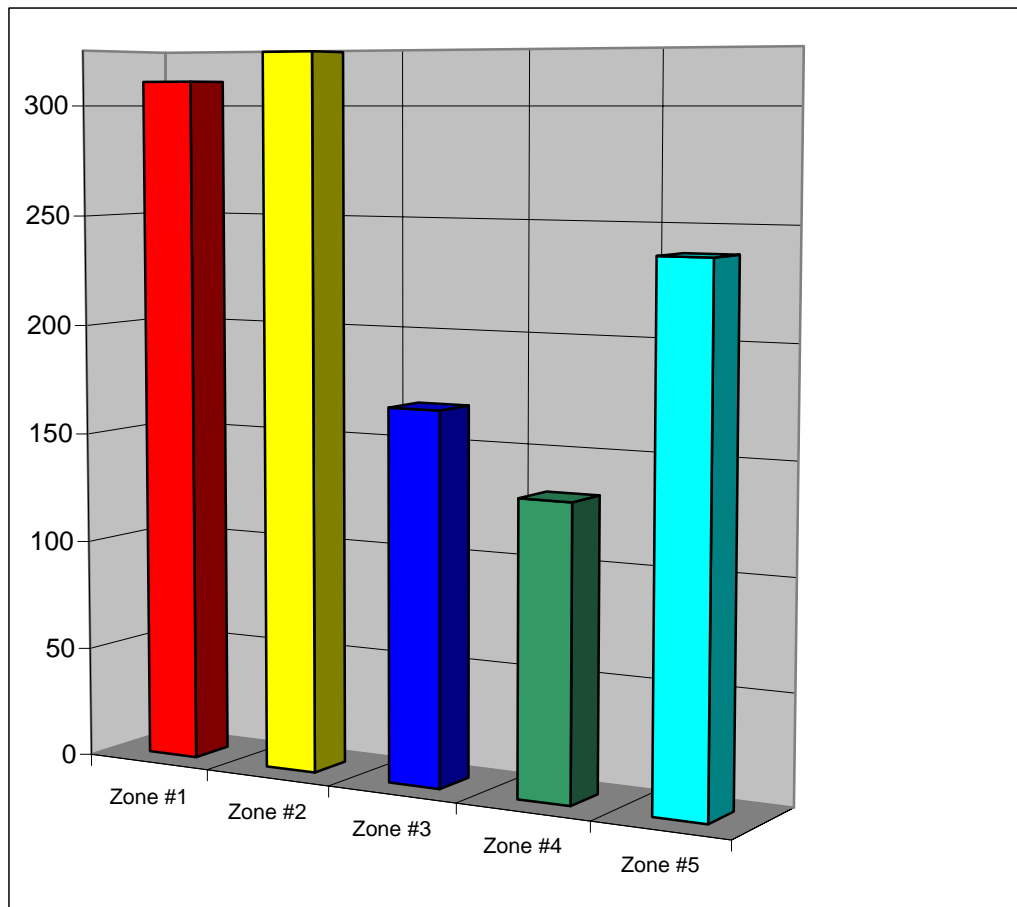

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EMERGENCY CALLS RUN PER STATION ZONE DURING THE YEAR OF 2006



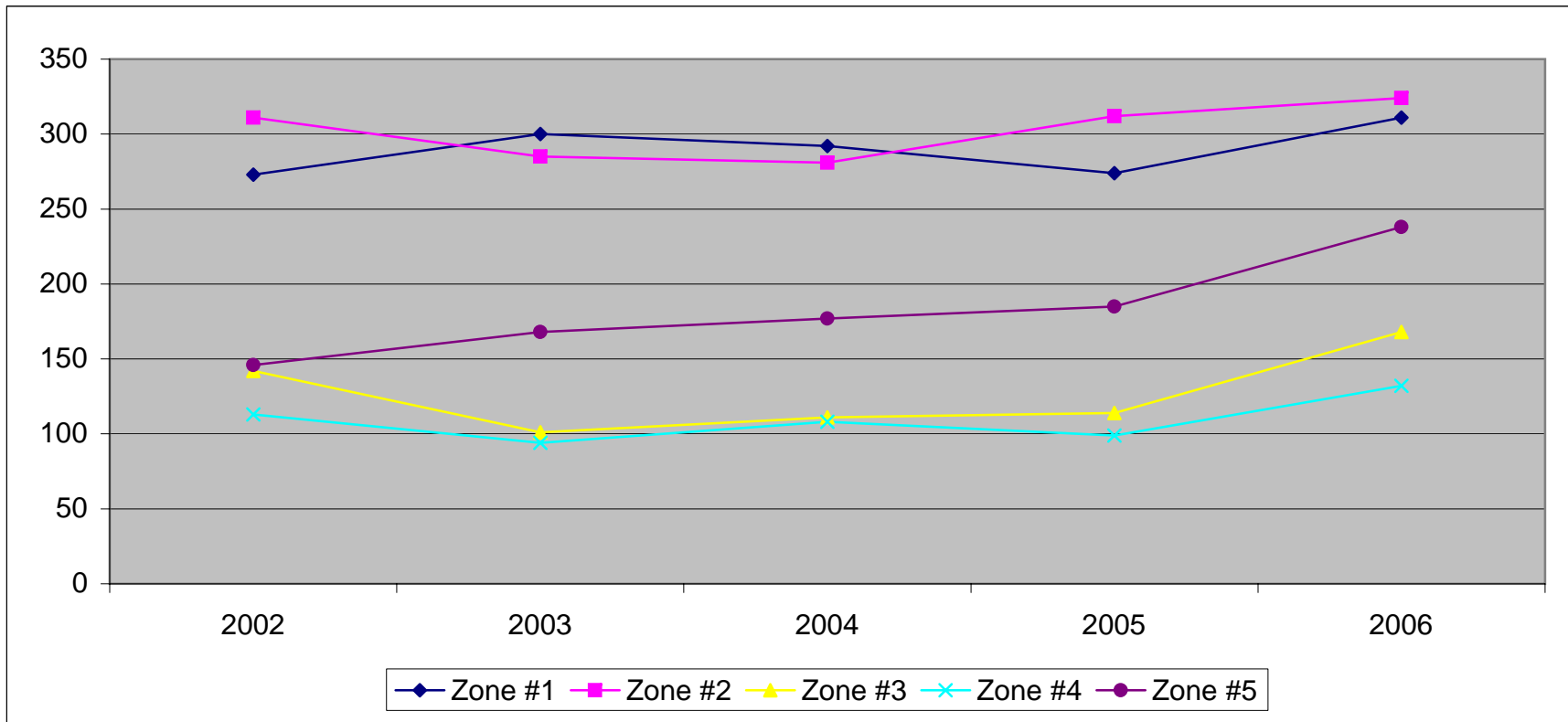

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EMERGENCY CALLS RUN PER STATION ZONE > 2002 THROUGH 2006 <



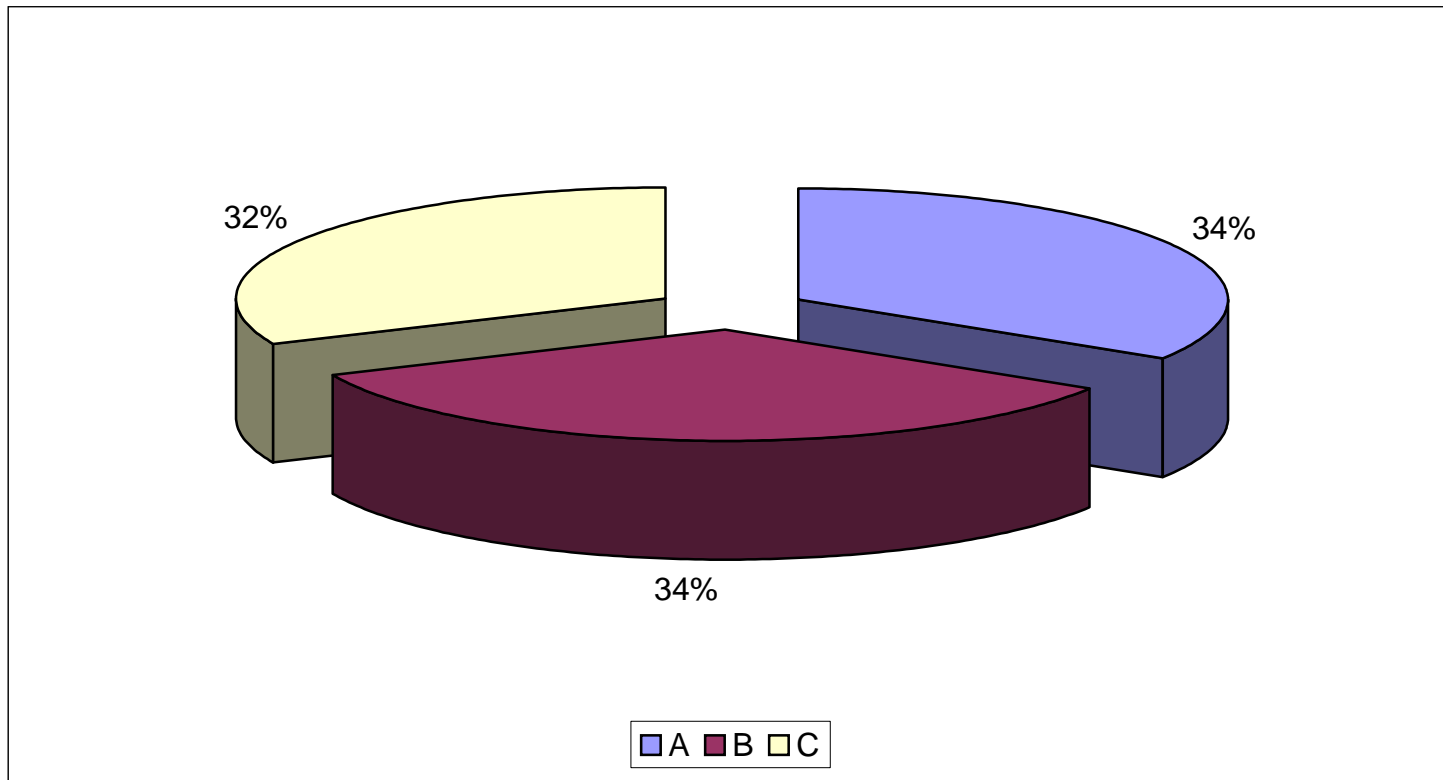

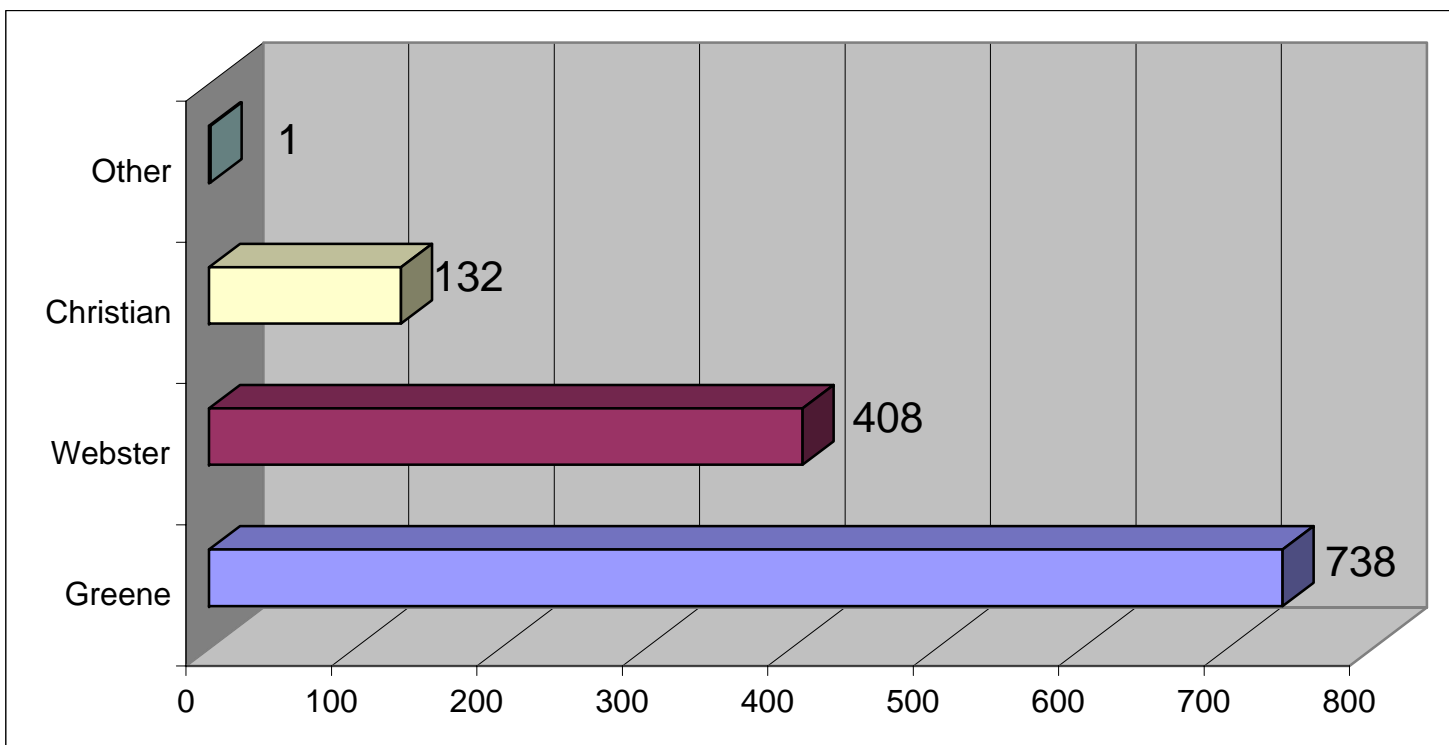

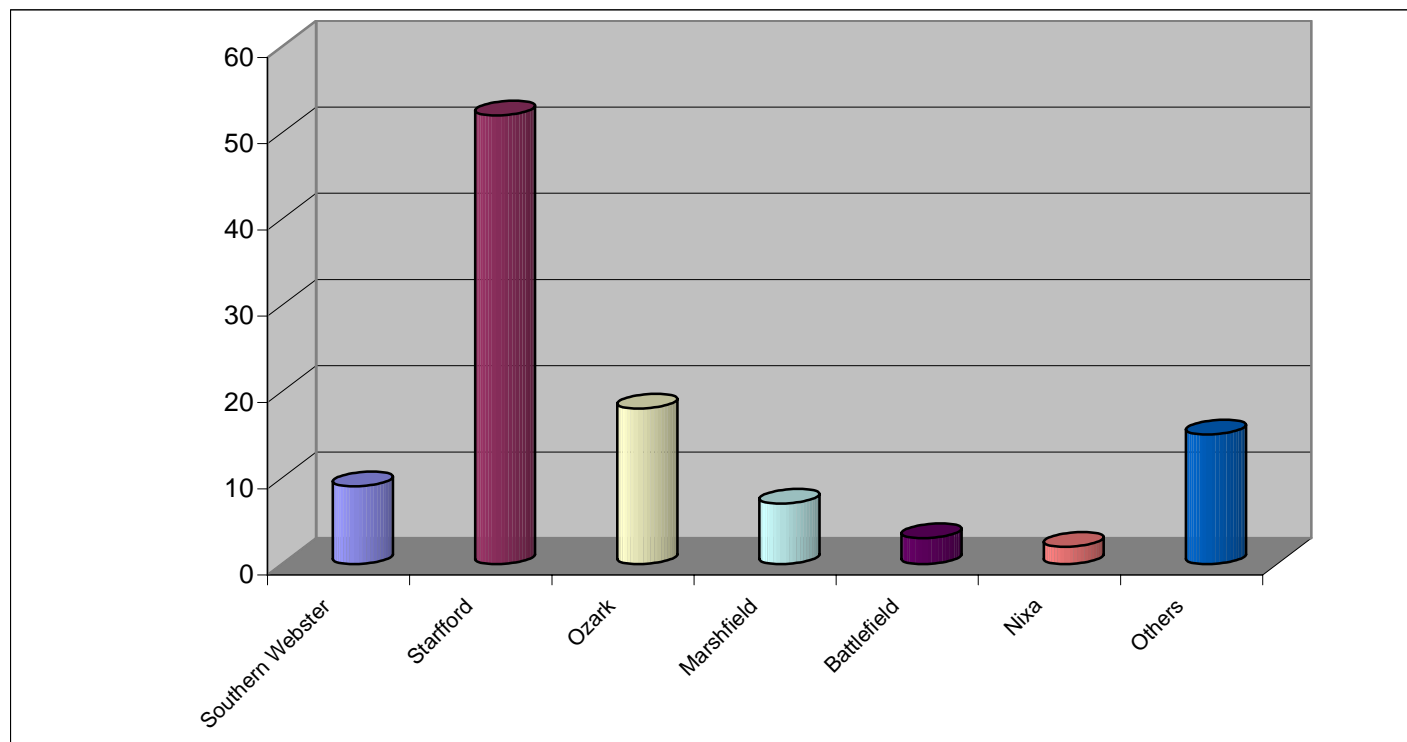

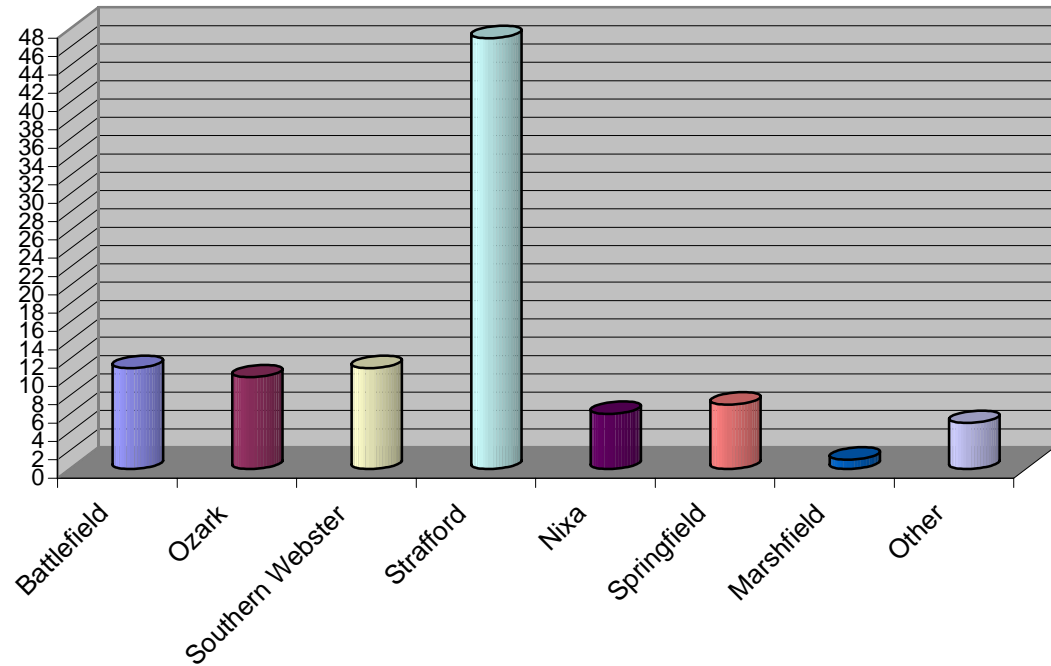

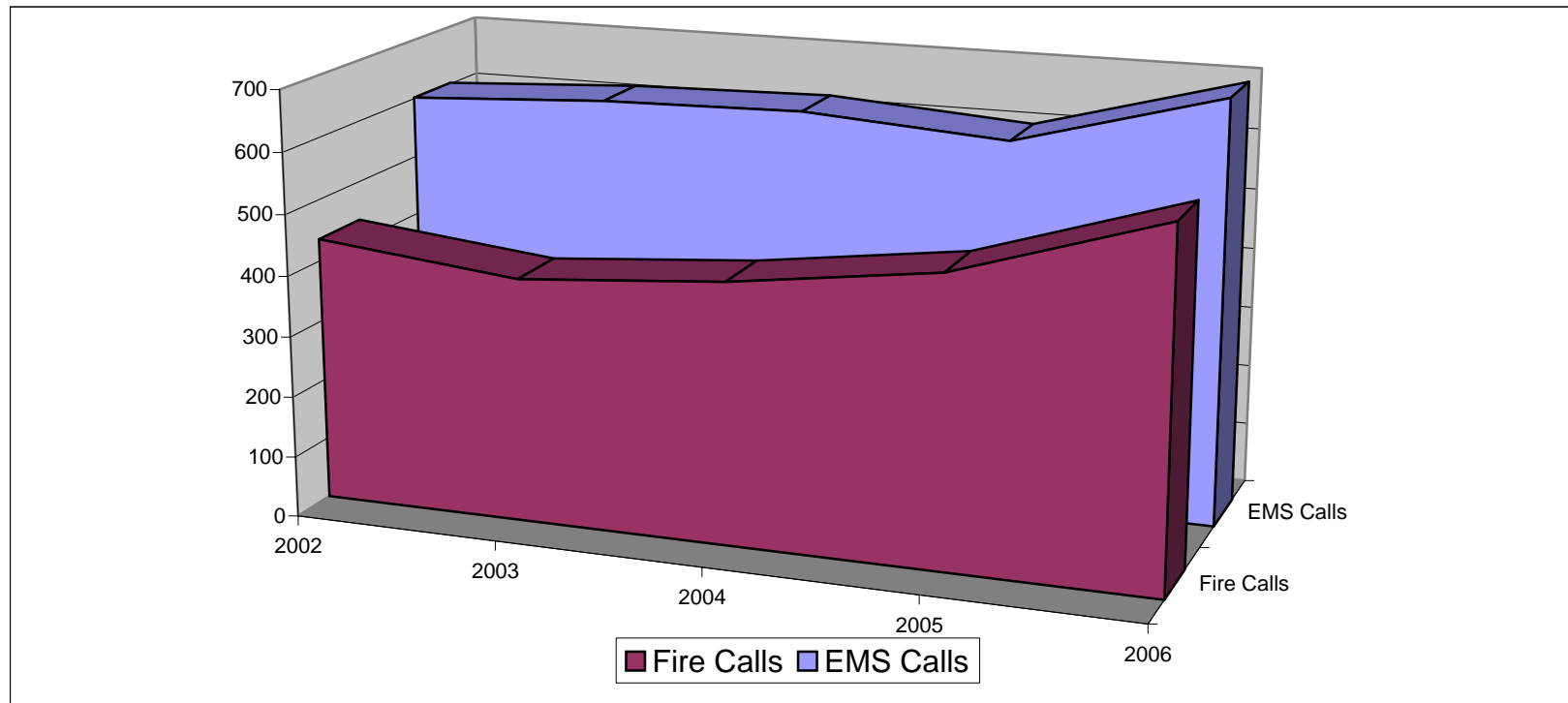




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TOTAL RESPONSE OF EMS VS. FIRE CALLS > 2002 THROUGH 2006 <
